Pastor: When we recall the people who stood in line at the nation's blood banks to make living donations from their very bodies, we can say together,

People: We give thanks for those who live on to pass on life and love.

Pastor: When we remember the millions of Americans, who gave so generously of their life and labor to endow funds to help the survivors and their families recover from their losses, we can say together,

People: We are grateful for generosity.

Pastor: When we recall the thousands of workers, women and men, old and young, single and married, American-born and those born in countries around the world, who did not escape the buildings, we can say together;

People: We remember the loss of human life.

Pastor: This is a day of solemn remembrance — of tragedy and sacrifice, of atrocity and heroism, of cruelty and kindness. On this day, we remember the 2,977 souls who perished seventeen years ago.
